<b>Biography (long descriptive text) – limited to 400 words</b>	Professor Rymer qualified in 1981 from Auckland School of Medicine. She commenced her specialist training in Obstetrics and Gynaecology in New Zealand and then moved to the UK in 1987, where she completed her training and was appointed as Senior Lecturer/Honorary Consultant at Guy's and St Thomas' Hospital in 1994. She was promoted to Professor in 2007 for teaching and research. Her main areas of interest are minimal access surgery, female genital mutilation, ovarian failure and medical education. She is currently on the Council for the RCOG and works for the GMC assessing medical schools.
<b>Research (long text)</b>	Her main area of research has been into ovarian failure and she has published about 140 peer reviewed publications.
<b>Teaching (long text)</b>	Ever since being appointed to her consultant role she has played a major role in teaching at KCL.
<b>Publications (long text)</b>	She has published 16 text books. She was the first to publish on the use of gynaecology teaching associates in the UK and these programmes are now well established in many medical schools in the UK.
