## FIFTH INTERNATIONAL CLINICAL SKILLS CONFERENCE 2013 ORGANISING COMMITTEE IN ATTENDANCE



Jean Ker is a Professor in Medical Education at the University of Dundee and is the Director of the Clinical Skills Centre. She founded the Scottish Clinical Skills Network in 2000. As part of the Scottish Clinical Skills Strategy she was appointed in 2007 as Clinical Lead in the development of the Scottish Clinical Skills Managed Educational Network ensuring safe educational standards of skills practice across the healthcare professions. She has had the opportunity to work in medical education and primary care development in Bangladesh, Moldova and Latvia on behalf of the World Health Organisation and British Council. She was awarded the University's 'Innovations in Teaching' prize in 2005 for the design, implementation and evaluation of the inter-professional ward simulation exercise and was Innovative Teacher of the Year in 2008. She introduced patient safety tools to the undergraduate medical curriculum and opportunities for rehearsing teamwork. She has developed the Dow Clinical Simulation Suite to enhance transfer of skills in 2011. She is currently involved in developing a transformational model of health care for chronic diseases in Kuwait. She was awarded a national ASME teaching travelling scholarship in 2011.



Jim Parle is Professor of Primary Care, and is Course director for the Physician Assistant PGDip Progamme. Jim graduated from medical school at Birmingham in 1978 and joined a run-down practice in Bartley Green in 1982, taking over in 1983. Since that time the practice has expanded from 4000 to 6500 patients, now has 5 partners and numerous staff, and is widely regarded as one of the foremost GP practices in Birmingham. Jim began his thyroid research career in 1988 and joined the Department of Primary Care in 1992, gaining a chair in Primary Care in 1999. Jim's main activity in his 20 years as an academic has been in education, leading on the introduction of a major community based teaching strand within the MBChB course; championing the place of non-biosciences such as ethics and law and behavioural science in the medical curriculum. Jim has led the development of community based experience for medical students, initiated with colleagues the innovative and successful intercalated degree in non-bioscience subjects, led the development of various types of simulation as enjoyable and effective learning methodologies for clinical skills and set up one of the first, and by most measures the most successful, postgraduate diploma in Physician Assistant studies in the UK. Jim is also leading innovative educational approaches such as using lay women to teach medical students how to perform female pelvic examinations. His research interests have been predominantly in thyroid epidemiology and in education. He has received grants from, among others, the RCGP, PPP (now the Health Foundation) and the NIHR.

Jim is well known in the fields of thyroid epidemiology and, in education, particularly in the development of innovative approaches to learning clinical skills. More recently (2012) he has temporarily taken over leadership of the highly successful cancer research team within Primary Care Clinical Sciences at the University of Birmingham.



Jennifer Hogan has been involved in simulation since 2000 and has a clinical background in critical care nursing having held senior positions at Monash Medical Centre, St Vincent's and Alfred Hospitals Jennifer has many years experience in the planning, delivery and evaluation of simulation education through being both a Coordinator and Instructor. In her current role as Manager of the Centre, Jennifer is responsible for the strategic direction of simulation education at Southern Health. Her simulation interests include setting standards for simulation instructor training. As part of her MClinEd, Jennifer conducted an extensive research project which aimed to explore techniques to optimise the learning process for participants when conducting 'pause and discuss' simulation scenarios.



Janice Rymer qualified with an MBCHB in 1981 from the University of Auckland New Zealand; she became a member of the RCOG in 1987 and fellow of the FRANZCOG in 1990. She was made a fellow of the RCOG in 2005. Professor Rymer's areas of special interest are Minimal Access Surgery, Ovarian Failure, Female Genital Mutilation and Medical Education. She has run the Menopause Research Unit at Guy's and St. Thomas' Hospital since 1990. From 1991 to 2010 she held responsibility for the organisation of undergraduate teaching in Obstetrics and Gynaecology, first at UMDS then Guy's, King's and St Thomas' and now King's College London School of Medicine and introduced the first Gynaecology Teaching Associate's Programme into a UK medical school. She was appointed as Dean of Undergraduate Medicine in 2010. Current Extramural positions include International Fellow on RCOG Council (2010-) and Member of the British Menopause Society Council (2010-). She is also on the General Medical Council team for assessing new medical schools.



Sari Ponzer, MD, was the Senior lecturer, Orthopaedic Surgery, 2001-2007. She has been the Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery from 2007 to present day. Sari was the Head of Department of Clinical Science and Education at the Södersjukhuset, Karolinska Institutet from 2002-2007. She was the Head of Curriculum committee for a new medical program, 2004-2006 and Program Director in the Undergraduate Medical Program from 2006-2007. She was Vice Dean for the Board of Higher Education Karolinska Institutet, 2008; Head of Curriculum Committee for a new nursing program 2009-9010 and Dean of Board of Education Karolinska Institutet, 2009-2011. Sari has been the Head of the Department of Orthopaedics, Södersjukhuset, since 2012



Heather is the Acting Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of General Practice, Monash University, Victoria, Australia. She is the 2012 convenor of the "John Murtagh Annual Update Course for General Practitioners", Melbourne, Australia and the joint convenor of the "Skillful General Practitioner", Prato, Italy, 2013. She is the key lead on the development of the new Masters of Family Medicine degree. She manages the strategic objective in the Department of General Practice. Heather has recently completed 10 years of operational and strategic management roles in medical and inter-professional clinical education at Austin Health and Melbourne Health (major tertiary referral hospitals) which included achievements in the development of clinical skills training, the implementation of the Junior Doctor Curriculum Framework and the expansion of new training opportunities within Victoria. The latter resulted in the creation of on-going training placements that reflected the Department of Health strategic directions. Through these interactions Heather has gained an appreciation of contemporary educational procedures and issues and also the factors that can detract or enhance their successful development and implementation.



Professor Annie Cushing Ph.D. FDSRCS, BDS, is Professor of Clinical Communication and Head of the Unit of Clinical and Communication Skills at Barts and The London School of Medicine and Dentistry, Queen Mary, University of London. She qualified as a dentist and changed career in 1991 to pursue communication skills education in healthcare. In 1998 she jointly chaired the Medical Interview Teaching Association, an organisation providing learner-centred, experiential training courses on communication for senior doctors. In 2005 she was Queen Mary lead for the successful Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL) in Clinical and Communication Skills, awarded jointly with City University, London. In 2009 she was a member of the Royal College of Physicians Working Party on Improving Communication between Doctors and Patients. She is adviser to the General Medical Council UK, Professional Linguistics Assessment Board on communication assessment and examiner training and currently leads a project for the UK Medical Schools Council to develop an assessment of communication competency for EU doctors applying to work in the UK. She is Chair of the UK Council of Clinical Communication in Undergraduate Medical Education.



Rola Ajjawi is Senior Lecturer at the Centre for Medical Education. She is a physiotherapist by training and worked as a clinical educator where she became interested in workplace learning and decision making. She moved into academia in 2003 to complete her PhD in learning to make decisions and then joined medical education full-time in 2006 at the University of Sydney. She joined the CME in April 2011 from Monash University and is deputy director of the postgraduate programmes in Medical Education at CME and lead for research, Masters and the short courses. Her research interests include: interprofessional education, clinical reasoning and workplace learning.



Mary was co-convenor of the first, second and third International Clinical Skills Conferences held in Prato and has subsequently remained a member of the organising committee. She has experience in medical education that has spanned two decades; primarily in the undergraduate arena and, more recently, in postgraduate medical education as Director of Education at the Australia and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists (ANZCA) and now at the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine (ACEM). Of particular relevance to this conference, she has established a clinical skills centre, established interprofessional skills teaching, coordinated a national project on core clinical competence, coordinated the empirical aspects of the Australian Medical Education Study (AMES) and runs instructor training for skills programmes at the Royal Australasian College of Surgery. Teacher training has been a major focus of her professional work including the establishment of two Masters programmes in health professional education one of which was established as one of the early examples of interprofessional learning at the postgraduate level.



Kim Blake is a Professor of General Paediatrics at the IWK Health Centre and cross appointed with the Division of Medical Education at Dalhousie University. She is particularly interested in undergraduate medical education and has developed the Structured Communication Adolescent Guide (SCAG). She is published and recognised internationally.



Dr Lucy Chipchase is Professor of Physiotherapy. Director of Academic Program (Physiotherapy) at University of Western Sydney. Prior to this Lucy was a Senior Lecturer in Physiotherapy at the University of Queensland. Her education research interests include the use of telesupervision as a method to facilitate clinical learning in rural and remote regions: the preparedness of students and new graduates; the effectiveness of interprofessional supervision in work based learning and the effectiveness of models of continuing professional development in health professional education.

#### **Professor Tara Fenwick**

Tara Fenwick is Professor of Professional Education at the School of Education, University of Stirling in Scotland. Her current research and teaching focus on professionals' work, with particular interest in professionals' knowing-in-practice and changing professionalisms. She is the Director of ProPEL, an international network for research in Professional Practice, Education and Learning based at the University of Stirling http://www.propel.stir.ac.uk/. Her most recent books include Actor-Network Theory in Education (Routledge 2010) with Richard Edwards, Knowledge Mobilisation and Educational Research: Politics, Languages and Responsibilities (Routledge 2011) with Lesley Farrell, Emerging Approaches in Educational Research: Tracing the Socio-Material with Richard Edwards and Peter Sawchuk, and Educating the Global Workforce (Routledge 2007) with Lesley Farrell.



#### **Director Gayle Gliva-McConvey**

Gayle Gliva-McConvey has been the Director of Professional Skills Teaching and Assessment at Eastern Virginia Medical School (EVMS) since its inception in 1994. For over 39 years she has developed and integrated the Standardized Patient (SP) methodology in clinical skills assessment and training. As Howard Barrows' first non-physician SP Educator, she directed the first Standardized Patient Program at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario Canada. She has numerous publications on SPs and has presented at over 150 conferences in North America, Spain, Netherlands, and the West Indies. She has helped develop programs throughout North America, China, Puerto Rico, Moldova and Singapore.

In 1998 she received the first annual award from the American Association of Medical Colleges (AAMC) recognizing her contributions in the field of Standardized Patient Educators. She was one of the founding board members of the Association of Standardized Patient Educators (ASPE). She represented ASPE on the Simulation Inventory Advisory Committee with AAMC and the Society of Simulation in Healthcare (SSH). She is presently on the SSH certification committee's executive committee and on the certification test development sub-committee.

In January 2012 she became the President for ASPE.



#### **Professor Rick ledema- Biography**

Rick ledema (PhD USyd) is Research Professor and Director of the Centre for Health Communication at the University of Technology Sydney. He is also Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences of Australia (FASSA) and Associate Editor of the journal Health Expectations. His research explores how communication impacts on care organisation, quality and safety, and how in situ conduct may realise health care reform. His most recent work focuses on clinical handover, incident disclosure and professional communication around risk and infection control. He has a co-authored book forthcoming with Radcliffe Oxford, titled 'Innovative approaches to clinical practice improvement'



#### **Dr Trevor Russell - Biography**

Trevor Russell is an Associate Professor in the Division of Physiotherapy within the School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences at the University of Queensland. He has a PhD in Telerehabilitation and co-directs the Telerehabilitation Research Unit at the University of Queensland. The primary aim of his research is to develop and evaluate the efficacy of telerehabilitation technologies for both clinical service provision and for teaching and learning in the rehabilitation sciences. His research includes costbenefit analysis and the development best practice guidelines for technology implementation. He is the program coordinator for the Masters of Physiotherapy Studies program at the University of Queensland.



#### **Professor Michael Wolf - Biography**

Dr. Michael Wolf is a Professor of Medicine and serves as Associate Division Chief - Research for General Internal Medicine & Geriatrics at the Feinberg School of Medicine, Northwestern University (Chicago, IL USA). As a cognitive-behavioural scientist and health services researcher, he holds joint appointments in Psychiatry, Learning Sciences, and Medical Social Sciences. Dr. Wolf is a widely-published and internationally-recognised expert on health literacy and health promotion, medication safety and adherence, and use of health technologies to support patient education. He is extensively funded by the National Institutes of Health and Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, and has served on numerous advisory panels for the Institute of Medicine, Food and Drug Administration, U.S. Pharmacopeia, American College of Physicians and American Medical Association. In 2010-2011, he served as a J. William Fulbright distinguished faculty fellow in the United Kingdom to promote health literacy and health disparities research. He is the founding director of Northwestern's Health Literacy and Learning Program (HeLP) - a collaboration between the Schools of Medicine and Education to re-design hospitals and healthcare systems to become more effective learning environments.



#### **Professor Amitai Ziv - Biography**

Professor Amitai Ziv MD, MHA, is Deputy Director of the Sheba Medical Centre at Tel Hashomer, Israel responsible for Patient Safety and Risk Management; he is also founder and Director of MSR - the Israel Centre for Medical Simulation. Prof. Ziv was a veteran combat pilot and instructor in the Israeli Air-Force. He trained as a Paediatrician in Israel (Hebrew University - Hadassah Medical Centre) with sub-specialties in Adolescent Medicine (University of Pennsylvania, USA) and in Medical Management, and a Masters degree (Tel-Aviv University) in Health Administration.

Prof. Ziv has served as a consultant for the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates International Clinical Skills Assessment (CSA) programs in Israel, Spain, Brazil, Russia, Ukraine, Italy and the US, and was a member of the CSA Test Development Team in Philadelphia.

Prof. Ziv is a world renowned expert in the field of medical simulation and has been invited to give keynote talks at multiple medical conferences worldwide, as well as Grand Rounds at leading medical institutions including Mayo Clinic, McGill University, Hospital for Sick Kids in Toronto, Foundation for Medical Education in Japan, Medical Council of Canada, Albert Einstein Medical Centre in Sao Paolo Brazil and many more. He founded the Israel Centre for Medical Simulation to lead a nationwide effort to introduce new standards and innovative approaches to health care training and patient safety education. He is also the recipient of national and international awards including The 2007 Charles Bronfman Award for Humanitarian Action and The 2007 Michener Honorary Diploma of Health Science Award for leadership and commitment to the for Applied health sciences.

Prof. Ziv served on the founding editorial board of the Journal of the Society for Simulation in Healthcare (SSH). He is also past chair of the Credentialing, Accreditation, Technology, and Standards (CATS) committee of the SSH. He also served as a member of two WHO Patient Safety Alliance Expert Working Groups on Medical School Patient Safety Curriculum and on Patient Safety Technology. Prof. Ziv is a Clinical Associate Professor and Chairman of the Department of Medical Education at the Tel Aviv University Sackler Medical School. He also holds an Adjunct Associate Professor position at Mayo Clinic (Medical Education) and at Case Western Reserve University (Paediatrics).

#### **Credit Cards and Currency Exchange**

Major cards are accepted at most retail venues. ATM/Cash machines can be found and will take credit cards, EFTPOS/debit cards with international symbols such as CIRRUS.

#### **Gratuities**

In Italy tipping is customary for waiting staff, taxis etc. About 10-12% should be added to your bill.

In small family restaurants in Prato, tipping is not always appropriate or accepted. We have had change returned to us when it was not necessary. You will have to gauge this on an individual basis.





Prato is a small but thriving Tuscan city, with a beautiful historic centre and a vibrant cultural and economic life. Famous for its textile industry, the city has a population of 180,000 inhabitants, a growing percentage of whom are immigrants from mainland China, the Indian sub-continent, north and West Africa and elsewhere,

Prato has a rich historical and artistic patrimony, including a mid-13th century castle built by the Hohenstaufen Emperors, almost perfectly preserved medievel walls which enclose the ancient city centre, a Romanespue cum Gothic cathedral dedicated to

Santo Stefano with an external pulpit by Donatello and Michelozzo, the church of Santa Maria delle Carceri by Giuliano da Sangallo, and the well preserved Palazzo Datini, the late 14th century home of the famous 'Merchant of Prato', Francesco Datini.

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








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
