	Between 2005 and 2014 I held positions within ANZAHPE and was scientific chair for two conferences. In 2016 I received a university award for sustained excellence in teaching. I was on the organising committee for the 2024 Ottawa conference. I was awarded Honorary membership of ANZAHPE in 2024. I am enjoying being an academic without portfolio since stepping down as Head. To relax I like to cook, create and engage with the arts, travel, and get out into nature.
Research (long text)	I have an eclectic mix of research activity and publications which includes: qualitative and quantitative methodologies, health professional education and clinical practice. Skills-based research has been a major focus. Much of my output has been in collaboration locally, regionally or internationally (e.g. UK, Australia, North America, Hong Kong & Japan). Teaching (long text)	I have been involved in undergraduate and postgraduate education for 30 years. Undergraduate teaching has mainly focussed on clinical and professional skills.
